

Tomorrow is a Holiday

'List of poets I like who have written about Machu Picchu: Hamish Ballantyne. Hamish's poems are written in tents, they find language rooted under trees - not the mother tree but the mother of all class wars. Don't confuse the Rosy Brittlepill with other russulas: these poems are edible but they will poison you. The war of the woods. Now you're logrolling!'

'Shivers of mood—now blunt, now gleaming—pierce and puzzle *Tomorrow is a Holiday*. Set in a landscape of community centres and encampments, canneries and processing plants, A&Ws and Tim Hortons, under "billboards advertising billboard space," or as a transposition of St. John of the Cross into the precarious *noir* of the now, these crystalline sequences give way to affinities that resist what the "imagination a parasite swimming in memory / makes / of the past.'

'With clairvoyant energy, the serial poems in *Tomorrow is a Holiday* expand rapidly to indicate individual lives inside the paranormal pressures of language. The lyric momentum of this four-poem sequence channels daily events in Vancouver, where lyric subjectivities expand by a reception of voices at ground level. Here, people sleep for a "month in the pub parking lot," and in dreamlike privation are "always short of revelatory / but a constant stream thereof." Hamish Ballantyne's sympathy for a public world and his sensitivity to the phantom exigencies of language help us come awake to poetry's disclosure of spiritual realities, "deserted first by reason then / the sandstorm of experience." This book is on the street, in the heart and ear. It's beautiful.'

In *Tomorrow is a Holiday*, Hamish Ballantyne resists the urge of revelation in favour of idiomatic observations.

Divided in four parts, the last of which draws on translations of San Juan de la Cruz, these poems sit by the ocean or by the felled spruce, from within the tent on the mountain or on city streets, and Ballantyne serves as a narrator at the margins of it all. The curious restlessness of a poet's eye settling on the world, but there is much in the field of view and these deceptively simple scenes give way to exquisite sensitivity.

Contributor Bio

Hamish Ballantyne is a poet and translator based on the unceded territories of the xʷməθkʷəy̓əm, Skwxwú7mesh, and səlilwətaʔ peoples (Vancouver, Canada). He works in the Downtown Eastside and as a commercial mushroom picker. Ballantyne has published two chapbooks, *Imitation Crab* (Knife/Fork/Book, 2020) and *Blue Knight* (Auric Press, 2022). *Tomorrow is a Holiday* is his first full length collection.





'The feeling I get when reading is like looking out the window of a high speed train, except we don't have those here. Also, the ear doesn't look, even if we "do the mask discard for the gram." Still, everything is moving faster and faster, so I can't re-cognize until it's passed (past). Resistance gets "levelled up" into whatever stage of madness this is, I've lost track. But Burnham keeps up while refusing to not remember, which is funny in time's almost. Absurd the ways language spins out in societies of control. That is to say, even as its (t)errors are splicing things up in the feedback loops, this poetry is my listening's hearing getting better.'

'*The Goldberg Variations* pays attention to everything at the same time, from Mariupol to Attawapiskat, marshalling observation, slogan, idiom, and heard speech into the tyrannical counterpoint of typed text. Its preoccupations are degenerate and internationalist, weighing in on tactics of resistance, 80s conceptualism, and the efficacy of the cockroach traps around Ol' Dirty Bastard's childhood bed. This writing is an ethic of rampant engagement, "of voting with your feet", of being there (everywhere).'

The Goldberg Variations takes as its organizing principle the idea of contingency – the world thrown into Being that the poet encounters – and variation, or Bach's looping, recombinant system, as a way to turn into verse what shows up in the Notes app – with all the affordances of certain line lengths, the overheard, pop culture, jargon, slang and invective, tree talk, the political and the beautiful, and organizes that raw material, that "language", into the building blocks of the poem – sonnets and columns, words big and small, short and long, the clusterfuck of 2020 and before and since, desire and lack and maybe luck, good or bad.

Clint Burnham is a poet and academic from Comox, British Columbia. His recent books include *Pound @ Guantánamo* (Talon, 2016), and *White Lie* (Anvil, 2021). Burnham's writing has appeared in *The Capilano Review*, *Artforum*, *The Globe and Mail*, and *The Vancouver Sun*. He has taught at the University of British Columbia, Emily Carr Institute of Art and Design, Capilano College, and, since 2007, at Simon Fraser University.





Misguided*My Jesus Freak Life In a Doomsday Cult*By (author) Perry Bulwer

Perry Bulwer has given us a real treasure, especially given that so few cult memoirs are written from a male perspective. He takes us on a wild and conflicted journey as a member of the Children of God, starting at age 16, living here, there, and everywhere – from Canada to Japan, China, the Philippines, and more. Readers will gain a vivid picture of life in a cult with worldwide spread, led by a pedophilic narcissist. Definitely a book you will want to read!

Misguided provides a detailed, heart-felt look inside the most notorious Christian sect to emerge from the spiritual counterculture of the 1970s. Perry Bulwer's memoir serves as damning indictment of the damage done when twisted prophesy meets blind faith.

Perry Bulwer has written a deeply personal and richly informative study that shows how a shy but smart (and rather religious) working class kid gets drawn into an emotionally and physically abusive cult, which was constructed around the often angry but always self-serving fantasies of a delusional but inspirational leader. He weaves stories about his own psycho-emotional development within the cultural context of generational disillusionment about traditional politics and religion, both of which the cult leader prophesized would extinguish in an apocalyptic return of Jesus in 1993. That prophetic failure, plus Perry's eyewitness account of severe physical and mental abuse of the leader's granddaughter, contributed to his decision to leave, but twenty years of his own experiences of coercion, manipulation, and control haunt him long after he has renounced and debunked the cult's doctrines. His struggles reveal that a toxic cult still can live in a person long after that person no longer lives in a malign cult. This highly readable account, however, is an impressive achievement that reveals a toxicity that Perry hopes all other spiritual seekers can avoid.

A unique first-hand account of a life spent in the Children of God, a/k/a The Family, a millenarian doomsday sex cult under the sway of a charismatic leader, David Berg

In 1972, Perry Bulwer, a naive 16-year-old growing up in Port Alberni, a mill town on Vancouver Island in British Columbia, dropped out of high school to run away with the Children of God, one of a number of millennial Christian cults that sprang up in the 1960s and 1970s. Soon, Perry was preaching the cult's doomsday message on the streets of some of the largest cities in the world.

Bulwer takes the reader on an extraordinary trip through the world of biblical literalism, fundamentalist endtime fantasies, paranormal spirituality, evangelical extremism, ritual abuse, and liberally interpreted Biblical teachings that were used to justify licentious sexual doctrines, evangelical prostitution, and child sexual abuse.

Along the way, we learn about the inner workings of the CoG, a/k/a The Family, and the machinations of David Berg, a self-declared endtime prophet who claimed to be personally mentioned in the Bible, and that God spoke through him. Berg predicted the imminent destruction of America, the appearance of the Antichrist in 1985, and the Second Coming of Jesus in 1993. Berg died in 1994, before various law enforcement agencies around the world caught up with him.

Perry Bulwer escaped The Family in 1991, managing to escape the cult's tight control while living in Asia. Returning to Canada, he tried to pick up his life where he had left it off two decades earlier. Through education Bulwer lost his religion, turning from religious extremist to secular humanist lawyer, fighting for the rights of sex workers and drug users living on the streets of Vancouver. Born in Port Alberni, BC, in 1955, Perry Bulwer joined the Children of God after dropping out of high school at age 16, and spent the next two decades living in CoG communes in Canada, the United States, Japan, Korea, the Philippines, Malaysia, Macau, Hong Kong, and, undercover, in Beijing. In 1991, aged 36, he was able to escape the cult --- with no money or possessions, and little in the way of education or skills. He spent the next decade catching up on his studies, and in 2002, graduated from the University of British Columbia with a law degree.

After a 2004 diagnosis of PTSD and fibromyalgia, Bulwer retired from the practice of law (though he remains registered with the Law Society of BC). Back





A Tragedy in 5 Acts

Male Pregnancy in Reverse, a long poem "in 5 Acts", transmutes a disturbing and sometimes horrifying experience --- albeit one which is only ever obliquely and allegorically described --- into a dazzling and heady literary puzzle.

Wielding a rich and suggestive vocabulary largely drawn from Elizabethan literary texts, but working within a tradition that includes Rimbaud and Mallarme, Tom Prime revels in a lexicographic bubblebath that combines visual poetry, typographic moves, fragments of a play, speaking parts for a cast of characters that include Brayne-worme and the cuttlefish, and uneasy-laughter-inducing silliness.

A young man returns to the town of his youth after a period spent on the road.

Unable to rekindle a high school flame, Cal Bedrick, who is Jewish, soon meets a very nice Catholic girl, Frannie Sinkiewicz, who falls hard for the troubled young man. Their courtship leads quickly to a marriage that fills their acquaintances with doubts.

The young couple's story is set against the backdrop of a fictionalized Wausau, Wisconsin, when the Vietnam war is drawing to an end. Duck Island is peopled by a cast of small-town archetypes: Frannie's conservative family including her brother / patriarch, Joey, manager of the town's convenience store where Cal gets a job; Father Leszinski, the parish priest; Mr. Dula, who manages the men's shelter where Cal washes up; Frannie's best friend Wendy Gabriiska, and an assortment of war veterans, Indigenous people, immigrants, the town's merchants, and local low-lives who populate Wausau.


Like a David Lynch film, *Duck Island* vividly contrasts a society whose liberal surface conceals a troubled soul, which is revealed as the novel's events unfold.

Even as their readers move on-line and their advertisers look elsewhere, daily newspapers continue to be our main source of information, shaping citizens' understanding of the world, and their reactions to events. At the same time, continuing a long-term trend in media ownership, newsrooms have been gutted as new owners prioritize double-digit profit margins. Dwindling reporting staff is able to do less and less actual reporting, as they become more and more reliant on official releases and carefully tailored public relations handouts.

In *The Postmedia Effect*, Marc Edge takes Canada's dominant newspaper chain, Postmedia, as a case study laying bare the changes in news economics that over the past two generations have hollowed out the nation's newsrooms, undermining not just citizens' trust in what is reported to them, but the very foundations of a democracy steered by an informed electorate.

Marc Edge, a business journalist who worked for dailies in Vancouver and Calgary before completing a PhD in media economics, has been documenting the political-economic transformation of the news business from its mid-century concentration (*Pacific Press*, 2002), through "convergence" (*Asper Nation*, 2007), and now, in his new book, the dire effects of the financialization of the news business. His work has also appeared in *The News We Deserve* (2011) and *Red Line, Blue Line, Bottom Line* (2004). He lives in Nanaimo, BC.





Parents began sending their kids off to summer camp more than a century ago, a tradition that continues strong in the face of transformative changes to society, and childhood. The history of summer camping, with its roots in Boy Scouts and other Victorian-era social movements, is beginning to be written. But

until now, less has been said about the experiences of the generations of young men and women whose outlook has been shaped by their summer vacations.

In *My Paddle's Keen and Bright*, Rika Ruebsaat allows the camp veterans of all ages and backgrounds to reflect on their experiences, and the indelible lifelong impressions these have left on them.

Every facet of camp experience is described, from the bus or boat that takes you away from the familiar into a new world of strangers, to the bittersweet partings and memories lasting a lifetime. Campers describe the terror, and exhilaration, of learning about new people and different lives outside of their own families; the food, strange rituals, and exciting new adventures involving boats, or horses, or hikes, chores, even practical jokes. Here are the vivid recollections of passionate friendships made in the course of a few days; of crushes on counsellors; the campfires and songs; the first fumbling sexual explorations; the skinned knees and overcome fears; the lessons learned and carried for the rest of their lives.


Grown-ups from all social classes and outlooks established summer camps. The storytellers reflect on their experiences in the more traditional summer camps organized by Boy Scouts or Girl Guides; the camps organized by religious organizations or around political viewpoints. The differences --- and, more often, the continuities --- provide a fascinating and unique perspective into a world that continues to leave an indelible mark on society, even as the world of summer camp slips into history.

Rika Ruebsaat is the past president of the Princeton & District Museum & Archives, and has been a professional singer and, for most of her working life, a teacher. In 25 engaging essays, Summerland writer Don Gayton fuses the personal with the ecological to portray the geography and the natural and human history of his adopted Okanagan Valley homeland.

Draft resister and professional ecologist by training, Don Gayton registers the complexity and interconnectedness of every living thing in his environment, from the rivers and lakes, to the plants and animals, and the human settlements along the Okanagan, Similkameen, and Columbia watercourses shaping his backyard.

The Sky and the Patio describes the patterns made by iconic native species such as ponderosa pine, sagebrush and bunchgrass, the sockeye salmon and turtles, and the non-natives reshaping their world: the toadflax and knapweed, antelopebrush, horses and cattle --- and the grapevines, tomatoes and cannabis looking for a foothold today.


Gayton tells us what we can learn from tree rings besides the tree's age; some fine points about firewood; and a little bit about Chinook wawa, and his own library of nature writing.

As Buck Cherry – lead singer and guitarist of The Modernettes – Armstrong had himself a front row seat to the frenzy of the 70s and 80s alongside the likes of I Braineater, Joey Shithead, Dimwit, Chuck Biscuits, Mary Jo Kopechne, Art Bergmann and other figures of Vancouver's earliest punk days. From White Rock to Vancouver, the back rooms and alleys of the Smilin' Buddha to the Commodore Ballroom, *Guilty of Everything* recounts the drug-addled, booze-soaked days and nights of this anarchic era, brought to life once again by Armstrong's candid and compelling prose.



After Villon, the new book from Dorothy Livesay Poetry Prize finalist Roger Farr, is a book of contemporary verse translations and "queer variations" based on the work of 15th century *poete maudit* Francois Villon.

Villon's poetry, written in medieval French and incorporating the argot of the Parisian criminal underworld, is notoriously bawdy, opaque, and resistant to "straightforward" translation. For this reason, Villon's work continues to be of considerable interest to poets, artists, and scholars working today.

After Villon is informed by previous ventures into Villon's work by Ezra Pound (who invented a new poetic form, the *villonaud*), Basil Bunting, William Carlos Williams, and, especially, Jack Spicer, who similarly "translated" Lorca in his influential *After Lorca* (1957) and Jean Calais (Stephen Rodefer), whose chauvinist / "beatnik" version of the poet stepped forward in *Villon* (1987).

Roger Farr's new re-workings capture the in-group opacity in Villon's work by mingling slangs from a variety of discourses and sites, everything from prison, theatre, culinary, military, to carnie slang. In his translations, Farr subverts sex and gender designations by shifting pronouns, changing names, and refusing heteronormative assumptions about the copious "gaps" in meaning of the original texts.

Contributor Bio

Described as "a poet of great heart and aesthetic/political commitment", Roger Farr is the author of five books of poetry: **Surplus** (2006), **Means** (2012), **IKMQ** (2012), a finalist for the BC Book Prize in Poetry in 2013, **I Am a City Still But Soon I Shan't Be** (2019), and most recently, **After Villon** (2022). *The Amorous Comrade*, a collection of essays on anarchism and sexual politics, is forthcoming in 2024.

A former member of the artist-run Kootenay School of Writing collective, his critical writing on avant-garde poetics and radical social movements has appeared in *Anarchist Studies*, *Armed Cell*, *Fifth Estate*, *Perspectives on Anarchist Theory*, *The Poetic Front*, *West Coast Line*, and *XCP: Cross Cultural Poetics*. He edited the three-volume anthology *Open Text: Canadian Poetry and Poetics in the 21st Century* (2008-2013), and was Critical Editor for Alice Becker-Ho's *The Essence of Jargon: Argot & the Language of the Dangerous*

Gustave Morin has spent a life carving out a bold and courageous body of work that questions and expands the definition of poetry.

The vision and the range of his work, including the books *Clean Sails* (2015), *The Etcetera Barbecue* (2008), and *A Penny Dreadful* (2003), show him as one of the more accomplished literary innovators in our age, committed as he is to the opposite of whatever the official culture endorses.

His new book *Gongo Dodan* is comprised of sixty-two unusual poems, of course. Gustave Morin's poems have never played by the rules, opting instead to playing for keeps, gleefully channelling those cosmic and eternal verities that have long been associated with both the written word and the colossal image.


Gongo Dodan is the result of a lifetime of absorbed aesthetic philosophy shot through many critical social commentaries, all of which serve to illustrate how an amalgamation of a knowledge of the arts, when applied to the art of writing artfully, can come to inhabit one word pushed beyond its own inevitable plasticity - poetry.

Gustave Morin's previous New Star title, *Clean Sails* (2015) is the world's largest volume of typewriter poetry. The *Etcetera Barbecue* was published in 2006 by BookFug. His 2003 title, *A Penny Dreadful*, one of the few collage novels ever to appear in Canada, is now scarce. Gustave Morin has also produced twelve short-run books and chapbooks. Taken from the Anishinaabe for “woman wearing red,” *Miskwagoode* is an unsettling portrayal of unreconciled Indigenous experience under colonialism, past and present.

Miskwagoode, the woman in the red dress, is Annharte, and she is Annharte’s mother, who disappeared when the poet was a girl. *Miskwagoode* is Annharte’s new book about her mother loss, her “mothermiss”, about all the women “buried in common enough / cross-generational graves”.

Marked with her characteristic sharp eye and humour, and hard earned wisdom about the “ominous progress ahead”, Annharte’s fifth collection encompasses the poet’s experiences as an Anishinaabe Elder, “witness not survivor”, writing of the weight of a present and persisting colonialism.

In her sly, cheeky riffs on life behind the “buckskin curtain” at the margins of settler society, Annharte tells us about granny circles, the horny old guys, and getting your hair done. But these poems about rez life and the community and belonging it offers are set against the background radiation of the poverty and the sicknesses, despair, violence, sexism, and sexual abuse, the legacies of unequal relations.


Miskwagoode concludes with “Wabang,” a suite of short poems comprising Annharte’s own thumbnail transcontinental Indigenous mythology.

Bird Arsonist

Written with four hands, by Tom Prime and the Giller Prize and Governor General's Award shortlisted Gary Barwin, *Bird Arsonist* is avant-garde, tragicomic poetry at its most arresting.

They say the language of birds is the closest to that of the divine. They also say poetry is the unacknowledged legislator of the world. In *Bird Arsonist*, Tom Prime and Gary Barwin — like all good avant-gardists — flip these commonplaces on their heads, showing that poetry sets alight any transparent, easy, lawful language, or is precisely what language spits out as it turns to ash.

Compressed to the point of implosion, the poems that make up this volume are contorted descendants of Dadaism, Surrealism, and every other -ism. Prime and Barwin confront poetry's contemporary preference for confession and today's digitization of reality not only by — as they are two — using a doubled “I,” but also by letting language elide the human-all-too-human hand of authorship *tout court*. The author of *Bird Arsonist* is language itself, sonorous and fragmentary. Prime and Barwin have merely done the job of giving it the room to speak, of keeping it infected, of making visible the outline of its splinters and its cuts. Shake gently!

Tom Prime is a PhD candidate at Western University (specializing in 17th century female prophesy). His solo debut collection of poetry *Mouthfuls of Space* (Anvil) was shortlisted for the Gerald Lampert Memorial prize. He has published 2 collaboratively written collections of poetry with Gary Barwin (*Bird Arsonist* on New Star and *A Cemetery for Holes* on Gordon Hill Press). His forthcoming solo collection of poetry *Male Pregnancy in Reverse* will be released on New Star in September. He has been published in Lana Turner, Fjords Review, Typo, and many other journals, periodicals, anthologies, and chapbooks.

Gary Barwin is a writer, composer, musician, and multidisciplinary artist and has published 25 books of fiction, poetry, and numerous chapbooks. His latest books include *For It Is a Pleasure and a Surprise to Breathe*, ed. Alessandro Porco, and *Nothing the Same, Everything Haunted: The Ballad of Motl the Cowboy*. His national bestselling novel, *Yiddish for Pirates*, won the Stephen Leacock Award for Humour and the Canadian Jewish Literary Award and was also a finalist for both the Governor General's Award for Fiction and the Scotiabank Giller Prize. He lives



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
